PART IV - GENERAL INTEREST

Did you know???

The Royal Military College (RMC) in Kingston, Ontario, Canada, has a rich and storied history dating back to its establishment in 1876. Established by an Act of Parliament in 1874, the college officially opened its doors on June 1st, 1876. It was founded to provide professional military education and training to officer cadets for the Canadian Armed Forces. In the early days, the training was focused on training officers for the Army and the curriculum included military training, academic studies, and physical fitness.

During World War I, RMC played a significant role in training officers for the Canadian Expeditionary Forces. Many graduates of RMC served in various capacities during the war. In World War II, RMC continued its role in training officers, expanding its programs to meet the demands of the war effort. The college also contributed to research and development efforts related to military technology and tactics.

After the WW2, RMC adapted it program to reflect changing military needs and geopolitical realities. It continued to provide education and training to officers for the Canadian Armed Forces. In 1968, the CAF were unified, leading to changes in the structure and organization of military training and education. RMC became a tri-service institution, providing education and training to officers from the Canadian Army, Royal Canadian Navy, and Royal Canadian Air Force.
